# Riccall Wind Turbine – refused after Appeal

In January 2015 a Planning Inspector visited Riccall to see where it was proposed to put a 250 foot high turbine. Since then it has been a worrying time for Rod and Peggy Swann who live just 500 metres from the site. However the hope that it would be a case of “no news is good news” has paid off. On 29 September the decision letter was issued – the turbine was refused. In June 2015 Nigel Adams MP wrote to Greg Clark, Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government asking about the appeal and received the following reply :



*Appeal APP/N2739/W/14/2228428 at Riccall Business Park, Selby Road, Riccall. This appeal has not been recovered and is following the written representations procedure. An Inspector visited the appeal site on 27 January 2015 and the decision will be issued as soon as possible.*

We now know the outcome. Nigel Adams commenting on the decision said “The proposed turbine was only 450 metres from a small caravan park and would be prominent in views from the caravans and houses on the East of the A19. The key issue was the impact that the turbine would have on the landscape and I am very pleased that the inspector has decided that the harm done by the turbine is greater than the benefit of a relatively small amount of renewable energy.”

In making the case against the turbine Mrs Peggy Swann, who owns the site had conducted a survey of people who had visited Riccall for their holidays and the majority said they would be unlikely to return if the turbine was just 450 metres from them.



A major consideration for the Inspector was the statement made in June by Planning Minister, Greg Clark when he made it clear that communities should have a greater say over wind turbine planning decisions. It is clear that the views of people living in Riccall and those who have visited the farm for their holidays were taken into account when the final decision was made.

Councillor Ian Reynolds, who had been very concerned about the turbine and its location so close to holiday cottages said “This planning application was submitted in the summer of 2013 and I know how worrying it has been for the owners of the holiday cottages. It was very pleasing that this turbine, originally recommended for approval by Selby Planning Officers, was refused by the Planning Committee. It is even more pleasing that the turbine has now been refused by an independent Planning Inspector in the same way that the other turbine at Wistow Lordship was refused.”

## Traffic news

Riccall Parish Council continues to campaign for a permanent vehicle activated sign outside Riccall Park, following on from the success of the temporary one that you will have noticed there intermittently last year. We have signed up for another 4 year trial of the sign outside Riccall Park, so you will see it there for 6 week periods at one time as we share it with other local communities and we plan this year to have an extra socket on Kelfield Rd so that it can appear there at times too, in an effort to slow down motorists entering Riccall.



NYCC are to install double yellow lines outside the park to try and ease parking near the bus stop. The Parish Council are currently discussing solutions to improve the situation.

## Dog Fouling

Unfortunately this problem still persists in and around the village and we constantly receive complaints that dog are fouling our footpaths. This does not apply only to pavements, it also applies to grass verges and rights of way. On parts of the "Riccall Round Walk" the route takes walkers past the field gardens, which are looked after by the Lands Charity (you, our residents own the land). The grass cutting in these area's is nearly always carried out by volunteers and the field gardeners who have real pride in their plots and surroundings. Volunteers are now often reluctant to carry out necessary maintenance work due to dog fouling issues. Dogs should be kept under strict control when walking through public areas. Please consider other walkers and clean up after your dog for the good health of all of us.

## Safety first


North Yorkshire Fire & Rescue are urging householders to ensure their chimney is safe and to have their chimney swept by a registered chimney sweep. Latest statistics show that there were 6,000 chimney fires in England in 2013/14, but most are preventable.

Open fires not only warm up a home, but also create a unique relaxing ambience. With the numbers of people using open fires growing, the Fire Kills campaign has provided some top tips for safer chimneys.

- Always use a fire guard to protect against flying sparks from hot embers (even when you are in the room)
- Make sure embers are properly put out before you go to bed
- Keep chimneys and flues clean and well maintained.
- Install and regularly check smoke alarms.

### Chimney Fire Safety

A blocked or defective chimney can cause both chimney fires and carbon monoxide poisonings so it's very important to employ a professional qualified Chimney Sweep. Chimneys and flue-ways should be cleaned and checked to ensure they're free from debris and in full working order before the heating season and then maintained in line with the recommended guidelines:



Smokeless coals at least once a year


Wood Up to **four** times a year

Bituminous coal twice a year

Oil once a year

Gas once a year.



## Re-cycling at the Regen Centre

We are lucky to have a recycling site in the village, which is situated at the Regen Centre. We need to ensure that it is used correctly and that only appropriate items (glass, plastic, paper/card, cans, shoes/clothes) are left at it. There is no facility for household waste to be left here and it attracts vermin. Selby District Council will take action against anyone who leaves items which are not appropriate for our recycling site and have started to do so. Items which are not suitable for our recycling facility should be taken to the Household Waste Recycling Centre on Canal Road in Selby. We have asked Selby District Council to clear the recycling site on a more regular basis but unfortunately they are unable to visit Riccall more often than they do at present.



Fly tipping has happened on several occasions recently in other areas of Riccall too and this has been dealt with by Selby DC.

The Recycling Point at Riccall is a very well used amenity, so thank you to everyone who responsibly takes advantage of this community facility.

# Happy Birthday Regen



The Regen Centre celebrates its 15<sup>th</sup> birthday this year. The Centre, which was officially opened by HRH The Duke of York on 27 September 2000, is a registered charity providing community facilities in the parish of Riccall.

To develop these facilities, we rely on grants, fund raising and donations by individuals, groups and companies to supplement our day to day income. We have recently been offered a £3,572 grant from the Awards for All Lottery Fund towards the purchase of a portable PA system and a portable audio system to assist people with a hearing disability. We are also extremely grateful to have received donations of £500 and £250 from Drax Power and the Shepherd Group.

We are currently renovating our small hall from money raised from our fund raising activities and will shortly be resurfacing some of our outside play surfaces. # Riccall Lands Charity— Protecting heritage



**Do you know that as a community Riccall residents own 25 acres of land in six fields around the village?**

The trustees of Riccall Lands Charity are volunteers, and manage this land on your behalf. The land is intended for leisure use, and this includes the three areas of field gardens where locals rent plots to grow fruit and vegetables.

Riccall Parish Council hold a long term lease on two areas and manage the land at both Riccall Park and the Jubilee Sportsfield for the benefit of our residents.

The Charity was successful this year in letting two fields to a local farmer for growing potatoes, and the income this generated has allowed us to purchase a new bench and picnic table for the Millennium Green.

There has been a good take up of our field garden plots and only a few remain at the moment, so if you are considering growing your own produce next year, contact us as soon as possible. We can put beginners in touch with existing plot holders who can help mentor you if you are new to growing your own produce.

We welcome volunteers to help tackle some light clearance work, so if you have a little time to spare, come and help us look after your land. This helps avoid the costs of paying contractors.



## Local nature



### The Jewel of York

The Tansy beetle (*Chrysolina graminis*) is a beautiful iridescent green and copper leaf beetle, affectionately known as the 'Jewel of York'. The beetle is threatened with extinction from loss and fragmentation of habitat, particularly its food plant Tansy (*Tanacetum vulgare*). Its range is currently restricted to a 45 km stretch of the banks of the River Ouse around York. The Tansy Beetle Champions project aims to reverse the decline in population of this iconic beetle on the River Ouse through practical conservation tasks to improve the habitat, educating and engaging others with this fantastic creature and increasing our knowledge and understanding through surveying and data collection. The Tansy Beetle project also has an element of engaging with the public through delivering talks or guided walks.
